The regular meeting of the Board of Carbon County Commissioners (BOCC) commenced Tuesday, April 21, 2015 at the Platte Valley Community Center in Saratoga, Wyoming. Attending the meeting were; Chairman John Espy; Vice Chairman John Johnson; Commissioners Leo Chapman, Lindy Glode and Sue Jones.

Chairman Espy called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m.

**ADDITIONS / CORRECTIONS**

There were no additions or corrections to the agenda.

**VOUCHERS**

## **CONSENT AGENDA**

Commissioner Glode moved to approve the consent agenda. Commissioner Johnson seconded and Clerk Bartlett noted the consent agenda includes the April 7, 2015 regular meeting minutes; a bond for Donald R. Brinkman, Treasurer for the Carbon County Recreation Board – School District No. 1 in the amount of \$10,000.00 and Clerk of District Court receipts for \$3,058.98. Commissioner Johnson asked that the April 16, 2015 minutes be pulled and the BOCC agreed. The motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner Johnson discussed the motion made at the April 16, 2015 meeting and asked that it be corrected to reflect that negotiations could go down as low as 40% and the revised minutes be presented at a future meeting.

## **ELECTED OFFICIALS / DEPARTMENT HEADS**

## Clerk

Gwynn Bartlett, County Clerk reported that the BOCC signed a change order at the last meeting to include wardrobe closets and desks. These items were not in the original bid documents and the architect wasn't aware they would be required until recently. The contractor, Shepard Construction has ordered the items but they are 4-6 weeks out for delivery and the rooms cannot be opened until this is completed. She asked that Shepard's contract be extended, without penalty, through May 27, 2015.

Commissioner Johnson moved to extend the contract through May 27, 2015 with Shepard Construction for the Memorial Hospital of Carbon County Behavioral Health Seclusion Room Renovation with no penalty. Commissioner Glode seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Clerk Bartlett reported the Governor is considering appointing H. Michael Bennett and Erik Oblasser as part-time Assistant Public Defenders in this district. She asked if the BOCC had any comments on the matter and there were none.

Clerk Bartlett presented a board resignation from Rick Caldwell for the Rawlins-Carbon County Airport Board effective immediately due to personal reasons and noted she would advertise the vacancy.

Commissioner Jones moved with great regret to accept the resignation from Rick Caldwell from the Rawlins-Carbon County Airport Board. Commissioner Glode seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

Clerk Bartlett reported that healthcare reform is now requiring her office to track the offering of health insurance to employees and all of their dependents each month dating back to January. This offering will be tracked and reported to the IRS and employees on 1094 and 1095 IRS tax forms. She stated this will require her office to obtain names, social security numbers and addresses of all employees' dependents and that the county's current payroll software is not equipped to monitor this. She added she may need to purchase additional software to handle the matter but she will be working with the county's brokers on options.

Clerk Bartlett discussed an e-mail addressing the ceilometer at the Dixon Airport, part of the AWOS equipment. She reported the equipment may need upgraded and could cost as much \$25,000.00 and the county may have to pay at least 20% of the cost.

Commissioner Jones reported that the county's engineer, GDA will be monitoring this and working with the county on replacement and potentially finding Wyoming Department of Transportation funding but that the county's equipment is currently working without fail and does not need replaced immediately. The BOCC requested the clerk add this in the budget requests for now.

Clerk Bartlett reported a representative from Wells Fargo contacted her about the potential donation of property in Rawlins to the county including funds to demolish the uninhabitable

house on the property. The BOCC ultimately determined it was not interested in accepting the donation but asked the Clerk to put them in touch with Carbon County Economic Development Corporation who may want it.

### **Treasurer**

Cindy Baldwin, County Treasurer presented and the Chairman signed the county's industrial appraisal contract with T.Y. Pickett. She reported that she is presenting this on behalf of Cheryl Ross, County Assessor who is attending training. According to Treasurer Baldwin a motion was made at a previous meeting to approve this.

### **Sheriff**

County Sheriff Jerry Colson presented a quote from Long Technologies for purchase and installation of a new AC unit for the control room at the jail totaling \$7,000.00. He plans to use Jail operations and maintenance funds for the project.

Commissioner Glode moved to waive the procurement policy and approve the purchase of a jail air conditioning unit in the amount of \$7,000.00 from Long Building Technologies. Commissioner Johnson seconded and there was discussion about the procurement policy. Sheriff Colson stated that time is of the essence due to where the unit is located because the equipment in the room must maintain a steady temperature. He added Long is familiar with the facility and he prefers to use them. The motion carried unanimously.

### **Road & Bridge**

Bill Nation, Road & Bridge Superintendent reported approximately 30 miles of road throughout the county will be covered with magnesium chloride the last 4 days of April. He recently met with Ace Engineering and others on the Sage Creek Road project and they expect to conclude the entire project by October 31, 2015. He reminded the BOCC at the conclusion of this year there will be a 9.51% match by the county for this project. He noted approximately 2018 at the earliest, the road may begin being paved.

### **Emergency Management**

Chairman Espy reported that Emergency Management Coordinator John Zeiger requested he be given a county debit card. There was discussion about debit cards in general and the Clerk was asked if someone is personally responsible for the bill if a receipt is not presented. Clerk Bartlett stated nothing currently exists in policy but that she and the Attorney's Office could prepare a letter and have the employees sign it when they get their card.

Commissioner Chapman moved to allow John Zeiger to have a debit card in his official capacity as Emergency Management Coordinator. Commissioner Jones seconded and the motion failed with Commissioners Jones and Chapman voting for the motion and Commissioners Johnson and Glode and Chairman Espy voting against the motion.

**Attorney**

Ashley Mayfield Davis, Deputy County Attorney presented a resolution for special prosecutor to assist in a case. She explained there is a potential conflict for the Carbon County Attorney's Office and the defendant's attorney requested a special prosecutor. Chairman Espy recused himself from the matter and turned the floor over to Vice Chairman Johnson.

Commissioner Jones moved to authorize the Chairman's signature on Resolution No. 2015-10, a Resolution for Special Prosecutor. Commissioner Chapman seconded and the motion carried unanimously except for Chairman Espy who abstained due to conflict.

RESOLUTION FOR SPECIAL PROSECUTOR

WHEREAS, the Carbon County and Prosecuting Attorney has entered into an agreement with Patrick LeBrun, Fremont County Attorney for the Ninth Judicial District of Wyoming, or any of his deputy county attorneys, to assist in the case of State v. Trevor Scott Vorn, in which the Carbon County and Prosecuting Attorney's Office has either a conflict of interest or which would have the appearance of impropriety if pursued by that office; and

WHEREAS, the Fremont County Attorney's Office for the Ninth Judicial District will provide these services free of charge to Carbon County; and

WHEREAS, Wyoming Statute § 18-3-302 authorizes such appointment with consent of the Board of County Commissioners and said action benefits Carbon County;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that Board of County Commissioners of Carbon County, Wyoming consents to the appointment of Patrick LeBrun or any of his deputy county attorneys to serve as special deputy county and prosecuting attorney(s) in the above reference case.

**REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL FOR VOLUNTEERED FUNDS**

Heather Ross, Executive Director of the Children’s Advocacy Project (CAP) discussed the services her program offers in Carbon County. She stated their primary focus in Carbon County is forensic interview services with children who are victims of or witnesses to crimes, primarily sexual assault. They also offer free follow up counseling for victims and families. The county does not pay for this service although it is very important in the legal and investigative processes. Ms. Ross requested the county help fund the program in the amount of \$3,000.00. She added they are requesting the same amount from the City of Rawlins.

Dawnessa Snyder, Chief Deputy County Attorney, Jerry Colson, County Sheriff and Archie Roybal, County Undersheriff were present. Ms. Snyder discussed the importance of the interviews in prosecuting cases and ruling out prosecutions and stated her support for this program. Sheriff Colson stated his support and agreed with Ms. Snyder’s statements. The BOCC stated its support for the program and asked the Sheriff to include this in his budget.

**RECESS**

Chairman Espy called a recess at 3:09 p.m. and reconvened at 3:22 p.m.

**CONCERNED CITIZENS FOR WEST SNOWY RANGE TRAVEL MANAGEMENT PROPOSAL**

Dan Runner expressed his concerns and the concerns of citizens about the West Snowy Range Travel Management Proposal which may close US Forest Service roads in the Ryan Park area. He feels this is an extreme government overreach and he requested that the BOCC assist the public in this process.

Leon Heatherington agreed with Mr. Runner’s comments however stated he believes the real answer would be for federal budget funding to help with road maintenance to allow the roads to remain open.

State Representative for House District 47 Jerry Paxton echoed Mr. Runner’s comments and reported he requested the Legislative Service Office to investigate how the state laws work with federal laws and the result was that the BOCC may have more power over road closures than the legislators do and he offered to share the information he has. He also noted Sublette County went through a similar issue and that the BOCC may want to visit with them. He suggested there be more time before a final decision is made so the BOCC can investigate this further.

Commissioner Glode reported the Wyoming County Commissioners Association’s natural resource attorney will be present at their May meeting and the matter will be discussed further. This attorney told her the BOCC has no authority over the US Forest Service and she agreed that

more investigation needs done and more time needs to be allowed. Commissioner Glode stated she felt like the BOCC dropped the ball on the issue.

Commissioners Chapman and Johnson disagreed that the BOCC dropped the ball as in January 2014 they were simply approached as an introduction to the process and asked for comments and the BOCC did comment at that time. Commissioner Jones agreed that this is not as simple as it was proposed and also feels more time is needed. Chairman Espy agreed.

Representative Paxton also offered to provide the BOCC with a legislative update from the most recent session either at a BOCC meeting or through COG.

### **WEST SNOWY RANGE TRAVEL MANAGEMENT PROPOSAL**

Melanie Fullman, US Forest Service District Manager discussed the West Snowy Range Travel Management Proposal. She stated ecological, economic and social considerations are given to all projects including this one. She added that she has given a lot of thought to the recent public comments made but noted this is simply a proposal and far from a final decision. Ms. Fullman stated the road systems have been unsustainable for some time and in some cases unsafe. She discussed budget concerns and community responsibility in road safety. Ms. Fullman is willing to consider an extension of time for some additional comments but there must be a decision at some point knowing that it will be impossible to please everyone.

Commissioner Johnson questioned what roads would be maintained and to what level with a quote he heard at a previous meeting totaling approximately \$600,000.00 to maintain US Forest Service roads. Ms. Fullman stated a larger amount could ideally replace culverts timely, maintain bridges, keep ditches maintained and keep surface gravel where necessary. The \$600,000.00 plus would only do necessary maintenance and would only keep 17% of roads maintained on a 5-year average but that she only has just over \$200,000.00 in her budget to maintain these roads. Commissioner Johnson stated his concern for the estimates and quoted some county budget figures for more miles of year-round county road maintenance. She cited the topographical differences as well as the fact that county roads are usually not surrounded by trees making maintenance more tedious. She also said they must bid most of the maintenance work which likely inflates the cost.

Commissioner Jones discussed the fees collected by the state for the off road vehicle (ORV) trail system maintenance and stated the Forest Service has taken advantage of some of this funding. She discussed other funding streams for other projects and asked what affect the state's ORV road plans have on Ms. Fullman's plans and asked if there is more opportunity to piggy back on the state's funding. Ms. Fullman reported she has regular meetings with State Trails who designates funds based on the type of trails. She stated the Forest Service has no designation of their roads currently however she feels that the roads/trails will still be eligible for ORV funds currently.

Brad Cary offered the BOCC information from the Blue Ribbon Coalition who works on public road issues nationally.

Leon Heatherington suggested that individuals purchasing ORV stickers may pitch in a few extra dollars that could be designated for the Forest Service to ensure these roads remain open.

Commissioner Glode stated she has heard from most individuals there should be a longer comment period.

Larry Martin stated he is against closing any roads and he feels the forest has been mismanaged and the roads need to remain open to protect the forest.

Bill Nation, Road & Bridge Superintendent, asked the BOCC to include the value of connectivity of the roads not only to each other but as they connect to county roads. He also suggested that some of the ORV funds could be used towards connectivity of roads.

Cindy Bloomquist stated she would like to see the BOCC comments include a request that the Forest Service work with the Wyoming Game & Fish to protect animals.

Scott Kerbs stated the BOCC's comments should state that the roads should not be considered for prioritization they should be the first priority.

Stan Brooks stated both of Wyoming's US Senators voted in favor of new legislation that would approve the sale of federal land to the state and would the commission be in favor of legislation to allow the state to sell that land. He also asked what percentage of the county's tax collections goes to the maintenance of the county's road system and what percentage of the county taxpayers federal taxes goes towards the maintenance of the roads in the proposal.

### **CITIZEN / COMMISSIONER DISCUSSION**

Liz Wood, publisher of the Saratoga Sun reported she received the county's request for bid to be the official publication and asked the BOCC the exact criteria citing that she believes of the past four years she has presented the lowest bid but only been chosen twice. Clerk Bartlett reported that the request only asks for column inch pricing as well as circulation numbers. Commissioner Glode reported she feels that if the BOCC is using other criteria it should be listed. Clerk Bartlett was asked to provide the BOCC with the past four years of bid information. Sid Fox asked if the County Attorney's Office could inform him when and if he must use the official publication noting it is a matter of convenience to publish in the Rawlins Daily Times because they are a daily publication rather than a weekly publication like the Saratoga Sun.

Commissioner Chapman reported he contacted the city about a proclamation to declare a day for Pat Robbins of the Wyoming Business Council. He suggested the city, county and Economic Development Corporation jointly adopt such a proclamation and volunteered to come up with a draft.

Chairman Espy reported he has been working with the state sage grouse implementation team and therefore has not been able to attend the last two comment meetings on the West Snowy Range Travel Management Plan. The sage grouse public meeting will be later in May as advertised by the Wyoming Game & Fish.
