

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## I. Executive Summary of Findings

The purpose of the 2012 Carbon County Needs Assessment was to better understand the needs of people who are in poverty in Carbon County Wyoming. The intent of the needs assessment was to find out the following:

- Extent of poverty in Carbon County
- Factors that support the creation of poverty
- Factors that exacerbate the impact of poverty
- Services and resources currently available to offset creation or impact of poverty
- Priorities for meeting needs
- Barriers to services

To accomplish this a four pronged strategy was used in gaining such information that included community surveys, community meetings in four county locations, review of relevant quantitative data about Carbon County in key documents, and public comment that was held on September 6, 2012 with the Carbon County Action Program Board Members (hereinafter referred to as “Board”, human service community agencies and the public at large.

The survey consisted of demographic questions and eight questions related to human services needs. Fifteen service categories allowable under the Community Services Block Grant Program were used to guide the development of the categories of need used throughout the study. These categories were accessibility/affordability of medical services, dental services, prescription drugs, and eye care, affordable housing, child care, disability services, education, emergency services, employment and training, family services, food, commodities and nutrition services, linkages to other resources, mental health services, senior services, substance abuse services, transportation, and youth services.

The community survey was administered to 130 agency clients of current Community Service Block grant agencies and other service agencies, 70 human service delivery agencies, and 7 Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) agencies. One hundred eighty three (183) surveys were returned with a 59.6% return rate. The community and low-income client surveys included respondents from every community and age bracket in Carbon County. The high number of surveys from senior citizens may have skewed the survey results.

The three groups ranked in order the following as the most highly rated needs:

- Accessibility and affordability to medical services, dental services, prescription drugs and eye care
- Senior Services
- Affordable housing
- Transportation
- Child Care

- Food, Commodities and Nutrition Services

Community meetings were held with twenty-three (23) community members or representatives of CSBG agencies and at-large human service agencies in four Carbon County locations, i.e., Medicine Bow, Saratoga, Baggs and Rawlins from August 13, 2012 – August 27, 2012. The purpose of the community meetings was to determine the following:

- What human services are in Carbon County and their community?
- What are the most important needs?
- What are the least important needs?
- What do you think would help people in their community to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient?
- Any other comments?
- Do the comments verify information in survey?

A plethora of information was obtained from these community meetings. Their comments closely paralleled the needs as stated above with the exception of the need for child care in their community.

Thirty-one local, state and regional data resources were scanned for quantitative data on Carbon County CSBG participants, population, age, race and ethnicity, income/wages, number of households by income, employment, housing, cost of living, community service block grant poverty factors, health care access, dental health, teen births, maternal and infant health, child care, mental health, children and youth in poverty, and other community needs assessment results. The data mirrors the priority of needs as discussed in the previous two strategies.

Based on the strategies as described above, the following can be concluded to answer the original questions set out in this needs assessment:

**Extent of Poverty in Carbon County:**

- Carbon County holds 3.0% (1,863/62,636) of statewide population of those who live in poverty.
- 1,154 persons (8.2%) of the total Carbon County population live below the poverty level.
- 15.3% of children live near or below the poverty level (332 children, 0-18) live below 100% of Federal Poverty Level (2010) as compared to 12.8% statewide.
- In Carbon County there are 800 single parent families and of these 76.5% are headed by a single mother; of these over 50% are living below the poverty level.
- Between 37.32% and 42.65% of school-aged children have free or reduced lunch. Many more families are qualified for free and reduced lunch but they believe it is bad

to ask for help. Sally of Project Prevention in Saratoga indicated, “People don’t want to apply for the hot lunch program. Parents think it is bad.”

- While the census gives statistical data but it doesn’t describe the issues that families are struggling with nor does it reflect families that have a high capita income. Sally of Project Prevention indicated “The census doesn’t adequately reflect or translate to what children and families are struggling with. They do not reflect a high per capita income.”

#### **Factors that Support Creation of Poverty:**

- The cost of living (food, housing, apparel, transportation, medical, recreation and personal care) for Carbon County is the tenth highest in the State with a ranking of 101(tied with Natrona, and Lincoln Counties.) One Hundred (100) is the statewide average.
  - Transportation is the highest ranking (102). The distances between communities in Carbon County is great, gas is expensive for those that have an automobile, and transportation options are sometimes non-existent in the smaller communities.
  - Medical and recreation and personal care at a ranking of 101.
- Wyoming women working full time year round in Wyoming are paid only 64 cents to every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men working full time.
- More than 300 of the 4,134 families in Carbon County are living on less than \$18,310/year (family of 3 – mother and two children). In reality they would need to make more than \$28,000 to be truly self-sufficient.
- Many low income families work in the service industry with no health benefits. Headwater Economics states that service-providing employees were paid an average of \$27,524. In consideration that women make 36% less then men this equates to \$17,615.36.
- Nearly 19% (18.6%) of the Carbon County population has no health care coverage which leads to medical bills that impoverished families pay.

#### **Factors that Exacerbate Impacts of Poverty:**

- Monthly rental fee is easily more than 25% of take-home wages.
- Service jobs with poor wages and no benefits.
- Transportation from outlying areas to areas of services (medical, social services, etc.) is not always available.
- There were some good paying jobs but many of them have disappeared due to economic downturn.

- Single parents working and not home with their children may lead to home issues.
- High cost of groceries, gas and propane.
- Unsafe housing i.e., full of mold leads to other health issues.
- Medical services need to be at rates for fixed income people that are affordable and not \$85 to \$100 a visit.
- Seniors have cut down or quit taking medications so that they can pay utility bills which leads to other medical issues.
- Many are not qualified for services but don't have the resources to obtain them.

**Services and Resources Currently Available to Offset Creation or Impacts of Poverty:**

- Most services are available in Rawlins and Saratoga but little to no services available in outlying areas.
- Good linkages/referrals among various providers of services and resources in two pockets of population but in outlying areas information services are sketchy.
- Excellent resource directory for providers and agencies are providing linkages to resources.
- While the services may not be available, volunteers try to the best of their ability to fill in the gap.
- The Little Snake River Valley has created a Rural Health District to provide medical services, transportation to health care and prescription drugs.
- Carbon County Higher Education Center is offering wage negotiation workshops for high school females and the adult Latina population.

**Priorities for Meeting Needs:**

- Accessibility/Affordability to Medical Services. Dental, Prescription Drugs & Eye care (410 total points of clients and agencies)
- Senior Services (331 total points of clients and agencies)
- Affordable Housing (320 total points of clients and agencies)
- Transportation (241 total points of clients and agencies)
- Food/Commodities & Nutrition Services (230 total points of clients and agencies)
- And while Youth Services was not highly ranked, it is one of the goals of the CSBG funds. If funding is eliminated for this need, the problem could be exacerbated.

**Barriers to Services:**

- Attitudes of 30% of the population effects the rest of the 70% and prohibits the 70% to be engaged in the community and feeling a part of the community.

- Recommendation: We need to find ways to embrace the 70% - shopping, banking, health care, encouragement to stay in Carbon County and thrive in this community.
- Apathy leads to those needing services to not apply and to not participate in the public process. It also lessens the amount received from federal and state dollars. Of the survey respondents when asked, “What new services did your family need in the past three years?” sixty-nine (69) respondents indicated, “None or none that I qualify for.”
  - Recommendation: Involve the low income representatives of the Tripartite Board in engaging the low income population to apply for needed services.
- Clients need to know of services available and apply for them
  - Recommendation: Current Resource Directory for clients (short and sweet)
- Lack of funding (local, state, federal) to non-profits and county agencies
  - Recommendation: Develop community grant-writers or community-wide notice of funding opportunities.
- Lack of basic services in communities, i.e., grocery, gasoline and human services produces own problems and costs people more money to travel to other locations to obtain services.
  - Recommendation:
    - 1.) Explore business enterprise opportunities to fill the gaps in the outlying communities.
    - 2.) Explore county-wide transit system to assist people with transportation needs.

Based on the feedback that was received at the Dialogue on Poverty on September 6, 2012, it was agreed by the Board, the agencies and the public that Child Care should be added to the priority list because it was mentioned as a high priority by the human service agencies.

The Board elected to adopt a Community Action Plan that included funding in the following priority areas:

### **2012 Recommended PRIORITIES**

- Priority 1: Accessibility/Affordability to medical services, dental, prescription drugs and eye care
- Priority 2: Senior Services
- Priority 3: Affordable Housing
- Priority 4: Transportation
- Priority 5: Food/Commodities & Nutrition Services
- Priority 6: Child Care
- Priority 7: Youth Services



## II. Local Community Needs Assessment Introduction

The completion of a needs assessment every three years is required by the State of Wyoming, Wyoming Department of Health, Community Services Programs, and is a pre-requisite to a local entity receiving Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds.

The Carbon County Action Program (Tripartite Board) administers the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funds for Carbon County. See **Appendix A** for a list of members. The board is all volunteer. Theresa Pacheco is the President of the Board. Gwynn Bartlett, County Clerk and Cindy Baldwin, County Treasurer conducts the day-to-day activities for the board.

Carbon County Wyoming is the third largest county and is located along the southern border with Colorado, in the central part of the state. The Carbon County Action Program office is located in Rawlins Wyoming. Neighboring communities of Baggs, Dixon, Elk Mountain, Encampment, Hanna, Medicine Bow, Rawlins, Riverside, Saratoga and Sinclair are served by the Carbon County Action Program. The map below shows the location of the area served by the CSBG program.



The goal of the Carbon County Community Survey of Services and Needs was to provide input to the Carbon County Action Program in preparing the Community Action Plan. The Carbon County Action Program (Tripartite Board) consists of nine members with three members being elected officials, three elected low income representatives and three community at large members (see Appendix A- Carbon County Tripartite Board Members.) The Plan determines the need for Community Service Block Grant Funds, and assists the Board in determining the best uses for those funds. It was the intent of the assessment to answer the following questions:

- What is the extent of poverty in the county?
- What factors support the creation of poverty?
- What factors exacerbate the impacts of poverty?
- What services and resources are currently available to offset the creation or impacts of poverty?
- What are the priorities for meeting needs?
- What are the barriers to services? (i.e., knowledge, getting to the resources, childcare)

The Carbon County Action Program contracted with Sheela M. Schermetzler, Ed.S. of Laramie, Wyoming, a state-wide consultant specializing in grant writing, fundraising, needs assessment, evaluation, and special projects, to conduct the needs assessment. Ms. Schermetzler has been involved with the Community Services Block Grant Program in the State of Wyoming for the past eighteen years. A description of her experience and background is found in **Appendix B**.

### **III. Description of Needs Assessment Strategies Utilized & Results**

The approach to the needs assessment is that information is derived from three select sources. That is, the low-income population, CSBG agencies that serve the low income population and other human service delivery agencies that serve the low income in the various communities of Carbon County. With that in mind, a four-pronged strategy will be used in gaining such information and producing the community needs assessment. This strategy includes community surveys, Dialogue on Poverty focus groups at four locations across Carbon County including Rawlins, Saratoga, Baggs and Medicine Bow, review of relevant quantitative data about Carbon County, and lastly gaining additional public comment in a community forum where the results of the assessment were discussed. Each strategy is described and the results are reported in the following sections.

#### **A. Community Survey**

##### **1. Survey Distribution**

The community survey was administered to random citizens, specific low-income population, and human service delivery agencies. By surveying different populations differing perceptions of human service issues will be obtained. This will give the Carbon County Action Program a good cross-section of the populations that are served through the Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) funds.

The survey consisted of demographic questions and eight questions related to human services needs. Fifteen service categories allowable under the Community Services Block Grant Program were used to guide the development of the categories of need used throughout the study. These categories were accessibility/affordability of medical services, dental services, prescription drugs, and eye care, affordable housing, and eye care, affordable housing, child care, disability services, education, emergency services, employment and training, family services, food, commodities and nutrition services, linkages to other resources, mental health services, senior services, substance abuse services, transportation, and youth services. Of the eight questions, one question would enlist ranking of human service and health issues ranging from 1-5, two multiple choice questions with open-ended description of the response, and five open-ended questions.

The specific low-income population survey was distributed directly through the current Community Services Block Grant agencies and in turn was distributed to clients. Lastly, the human service agency surveys were distributed to the current Community Service Block Grant Agencies, and mailed to other federal, state, private for profit, private for non-profit and school agencies. The agencies were identified through an excellent community document, "Carbon County Community Resource Interagency Resource Directory, 2011-2012."

The following table reflects the number of surveys distributed and received:

Samples of the surveys are presented in **Appendix C**. The surveys were distributed and mailed August 3, 2012 and they were due by August 17, 2012. Compilation of the surveys was held during late August 2012. It is to be noted that in 2009, there was a 27.7% return rate. The number of surveys received provides statistical reliability for the Carbon County population (Source: Presentation, "Making Surveys Effective", Michael C. Rodriguez PhD, Minnesota Evaluation Studies Institute, March 2006).

## 2. Compilation of Client Survey Data

The client surveys were compiled according to two criteria including City/Town/Area of Residence and Age groups. Baggs, Dixon, Elk Mountain, Encampment, Hanna, Medicine Bow, Rawlins, Riverside, Saratoga, Sinclair, were represented in the survey. Age groups were compiled according to Less than 18, 18-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, 60-69, 70-79 and 80+. **Appendix D** reflects the demographics of the CSBG clients and the Human Service Provider clients. They are arranged according Town, Age Grouping and by question.

## 3. Summary of Data for Clients



<b>Top Eight Needs Of Agencies</b>



### 5. Comparison of Needs Between Clients and Agencies



## B. Community Meetings

Focus group interviews were held on the following dates and locations:

- Monday, August 13, 2012, 7:00PM, Medicine Bow Senior Center in Medicine Bow, 5 attendees
- Tuesday, August 14, 2012, 7:00PM Saratoga Senior Center in Saratoga, 6 attendees
- Friday, August 17, 2012 6:30PM Baggs Senior Center in Baggs, 2 attendees
- Monday, August 27, 2012, 7:00PM, Jeffrey Center in Rawlins, 10 attendees

Community members were invited through newspaper advertisements and postcard invitations (see Appendix G). The purpose of the focus group interviews was to ask questions regarding the following:

- What human services are available in Carbon County?
- What are the most important needs?
- What are the least important needs?
- What things would you like to work on in your community to get people out of poverty and become self sufficient.
- Are there any other comments?

All focus groups were provided with an introduction to the purpose of the needs assessment. Carbon County receives CSBG funds from the State Department of Health and the Tripartite Board oversees the award to agencies and monitors the funds. Every county in the state receives (CSBG) Community Services Block Grant funds. The purpose of the funds is to serve the low income needs of community. A requirement of the Block Grant program is to complete a Community Needs Assessment. This must be done every three (3) years. The Tripartite Board is made up of nine members – three elected officials, three community members, and three elected members that represent low income. Low income representatives are nominated by other community members. The Board advertises to the low income population of the election, and gets the word out to agencies that serve the low income population, i.e., maybe posted at DFS, low income apts., etc. Ballots are placed at locations that serve low income clients. The overall purpose of the Tripartite Board is that it is made up of people making decisions who are elected officials, citizens at large and low income individuals.

The report from this process will be given to the Tripartite Board on September 6, 2012 at the Carbon County Commissioner's meeting that is open to public. Sheela will report the results to the board. There are 3 components to this community needs assessment process – surveys, community meetings, statistical and demographical information. Surveys were sent to agencies that serve low income population so they can distribute them to clients to complete and return. We used the Carbon County Community Resource directory to send surveys to agencies. Agencies respond to surveys also. There are two types of agencies that received surveys- those that received CSBG funds and those agencies that have not received any CSBG funds. We are repeating these community meetings in 3 locations- Baggs, Saratoga and Rawlins. We use the same questions and format at each meeting.

The next source of information tool is statistical and demographic data. We look at all of these different sources/tools so there is integrity to findings. The Tripartite Board takes results and information from this community needs assessment and uses it to set priorities for funding. This is called a Community Action Plan. When the Board calls for applications for CSBG agencies they will match those grant applications with the greatest needs as reflected in the Community Action Plan. The Tripartite Board then decides what projects will be funded. It is anticipated \$72,143 of CSBG funds is available for Carbon County during FY 2013.

### **1. Summary of Responses**

In response to the question regarding what human services are available and what gaps in services in Carbon County following are the responses according to the areas of which meetings were held:

- Doctors do not stay.
- Diversifying the economy and making housing more attractive and more physicians.
- Suitable housing and shopping is more to be desirable. Day care – pretty costly. Have calls all of the time that they can afford. DFS will give vouchers if they are eligible.
- Juvenile services – no place if juveniles are in trouble – they are sent out of county. Do have money for crisis center – Carbon County Juvenile Services Board. Juvenile services. Provide crisis care, short-term placement for a few weeks. Cooling off period until they can get into a place of treatment.
- Affordable Housing – Section 8 has a year and a half waiting list. The federal requirements are pretty hefty and stringent. Rawlins used to have a huge pool of apartments to fall back on. We are down to a couple of private apartments that have Section 8 housing.
- Grocery stores – 1. There is no competition.
- Having trouble with employees that are on-time and have staff problems.
- Foster homes – no therapeutic foster homes and send to Casper. Not necessarily enough foster homes. Having a hard time finding homes.
- Education – challenge for the community, need for technical training in early community college level to train workers to be more productive.
- Substance abuse – huge issue, not adequate treatment and big need for treatment. Providers are overwhelmed with workload that we have. How many more would you need to fill the gap, to get professional staff? Sort of the same issues with physician.
- No inpatient substance abuse – long term investment of opening up a site and would be good. Not sure it would be viable.
- No homeless shelter.

In response to the question regarding what was the **least important need** in their community following were the responses from the four locations:

#### **Medicine Bow**

- Linkages to other resources
- Education – don't need ESL

#### **Saratoga**

- Education as the Community Center is providing GED at their computer lab.
- VA representative comes to Saratoga to help sign-up services. There is a VA van that takes clients to VA medical facilities.

**Baggs** – no discussion due to limited time.

**Rawlins**

- 3 Food, Commodities & Nutrition Services
- 2 Education
- 2 Substance Abuse services
- English as a Second Language
- Linkages to Other Resources
- Employment & Training
- Youth Services
- Senior Services at the Center but no need for home services, i.e., Meals on Wheels and Home Health Care.
- In response to the question regarding what was the most important need in the county following were the responses from the four locations:

**Medicine Bow**

- All are important

In response to the question regarding what areas would you like to work on for families to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient following is a summary of the responses from the four locations:

### **Medicine Bow**

- Affordability in the forms of grants or assistance for medical services for the uninsured that don't have insurance or don't necessarily qualify for government services.
- Transportation to food, this would help those that can't afford the gas.
- Food bank that includes staples, i.e., tuna, onions, potatoes, beans, rich, macaroni, spaghetti, sugar, flour. There also could be some kind of frozen meat such as hamburger patties or meat substitute such as peanut butter and cheese.
- Youth services – recreational activities, transportation to take them to the rec center in Hanna or establish a Big Brothers Big Sisters.

### **Saratoga**

- Good food for everyone.
- Assistance with medical help.
- Child care and youth services.
- Affordable low income housing. It's a pipedream. The only thing that is affordable because it is kind of shacks. People that have rentals have jacked up the rental fee.

### **Baggs**

- Transportation for medical.
- Senior housing that addresses medical issues.
- Child care

### **Rawlins**

- Emergency Housing and Assistance
- Soup Kitchen
- Senior Care – assisted living (2), adult day care
- Increase retail shopping opportunities
- Housing that is affordable and suitable

In response to the question regarding other comments following are the responses:

### **Medicine Bow**

- Think the youth are in danger and are at risk. They are falling through the cracks. Called DFS and they don't do anything about it.
- Send survey to Medicine Bow Elementary School.
- Send information on the Laramie Youth Crisis Center.

**Saratoga**

- Do not provide meals at local restaurant ever again as there was much abuse and never want to do that again.
- Sixty two percent (62%) of Medicaid costs in Wyoming are tobacco related, and the government would fix the policy they would have money to fund other programs.
- Doctors and hospitals need to change their viewpoint on health care.
- Very pleased with the doctors Dr. Knowlton and Dr. Bartholomew (cardiopulmonary)
- Have to travel to Rawlins to receive specialist care.
- Feel safe in Saratoga due to law enforcement.

**Baggs**

- Make more aware of services and dollars for grant through notices.
- More awareness of community leadership.
- We are underserved from county services, i.e., mental health, home health care services. The folks in Baggs feel like they are “step-children” of Carbon County. The folks in the County feel like we have money in the Valley. The folks in the Valley feel a bit neglected.
- A number of seniors have passed away and a number of them have moved out of the community due to the need for services.
- The community pulls together to get things done.
- Have a newspaper, and a women’s empowerment group.
- Don’t meet the needs of the poorest of the poorest. There should be family planning, and well-baby checks.

**Rawlins**

- Apathy of the community

Generally the comments parallel the needs as ranked in the survey. This provides validity to the survey responses.

## **2.) What kind of human services are there in Carbon County?**

There is a medical Clinic, ambulance (Southeast Wyoming Emergency Medical Services), fire, Senior Center, WIC (go into Rawlins), and DFS (go into Rawlins). There is a dentist, Morris Booth (Elk Mountain) retired out of Boulder. He comes every 2-3 weeks (April through October). He has a dental chair in his trailer – dentures, x-ray, extractions, and does it all.

Medicine Bow Health Clinic - flu shots, sports physicals, health fair, blood draws and dispenses antibiotics. There is a physician's assistant, Matt Bezzant. The Medicine Bow Health Center is a non-profit. A lot of people could take advantage of the health services but no money for services.

There are 3 churches – Baptist, Methodist and Episcopal. Someone called the Town Clerk and needed gas money. They were directed to go to the Church to get help.

### **Are there any gaps in services?**

There is no home health care that is local as the agencies can't afford the gas two or three times per week.

They come from Casper for critical care. There isn't anyone from Laramie or from Rawlins providing that service.

For those under 65 who are underinsured they can't pay for office visit and prescriptions. For other than antibiotics the citizens have to go to Laramie or Rawlins for prescriptions. We can't get low income to come to the clinic.

There are no mental health counselors. They are in Rawlins or Laramie.

There are no physical therapists . They are in Laramie or Rawlins.

There is no grocery store.

There is no food pantry. The one we had before was all donated food. We did commodities and we would have to go to Hanna. They won't deliver at the Senior Center.

Town van – Cost \$60.00 to run it to Laramie/Rawlins. Great thing when it started, received a grant for equipment. They need to lay down some ground rules with people for the use of it. Need money to run the van for maintenance and some gas. There are transportation problems. Lucy MBS Services will do maintenance on cars.

There is no law enforcement. The community did have two Hwy Patrol but they have been sent to Rock River and Elk Mountain.

There is no daycare.

There is no bank.

There are no parenting classes but don't know if the parents would come.

There are no substance abuse counselors, and no recreation for youth. The Community Hall has been renovated and is available for activities.

There is a need for weatherization help but there is a long waiting list with the agency that does that.

If we don't have to manage it, we would like transportation. Definitely could use home care.

There is a need for affordable housing for everyone. Most seniors have a home but they may need help to maintain it.

There is no eye care.

There is a an elementary school in town but the school officials are concerned that there aren't enough kids in the community to keep the school open. They would like to move the school to Hanna.

*Sheela Schermetzler passed out a hand-out a list of needs. First you will tell us the least important need and then the most important need. Every participant will respond. Linkages to other resources. We are doing a good job on this. A lady comes from Hanna to help citizens with forms for relief of property taxes.

Disability – don't have very many disabled.

Education – don't need ESL.

They all are important.

**4.) Of this list which service do you think is the most important?**

Job - Employment and Training, not very many jobs here. There aren't enough jobs.  
 Senior Services (meals, transportation and home aides)

The most important is medical Services, dental (can't afford), and prescription drugs.

Substance Abuse – Children are learning a lot about this because it is in their home and in front of their home – drinking and substance abuse (Marijuana) and meth. Meth is being made in the home. The meth use is spreading to youth. The children are drinking and drinking openly in public places. This is all that these children know. It is really pitiful. When we raised kids, we were more involved in our children. Two respondents indicated that substance abuse was the biggest problem. Even if there is law enforcement they don't do anything about it. County sheriff said "too small of potatoes."

Other – nothing for the kids to do. Get into trouble.

Disability services – not too much here. The Senior Center does help with independent living. People in the community do watch out for the disabled people.

Parenting classes is a lost cause. We need counseling to prevent the citizens from incarceration. We need to start with the children.

We need better housing – one house is full of black mold. We need rehabilitation money and help for people that need it.

We need child care.

**5.) What would you like your communities to work on for families to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient?**

- 1.) Accessibility/affordability to Medical Services, Dental Services, Prescription Drugs and Eye care – They need money to come to the Health clinic. There was a grant called Tri-County many years ago. We had to qualify our clients for dental, medical and could utilize the services. The grant doesn't help the uninsured help who aren't income qualified.
- 2.) Transportation to food – would help those that can't afford the gas to drive to Laramie or Rawlins.
- 3.) Food bank. Maybe we should think about starting this. It would include staples including tuna, onions, potatoes, beans, rice, macaroni, spaghetti, sugar, flour. There should also be some kinds of frozen meat, i.e., hamburger patties. It should also include peanut butter, cheese. Sinclair is doing commodities. We don't have it.
- 4.) Youth services – recreational activities, or transportation to take them to the rec center in Hanna and have swimming lessons. We need a Big Brothers Big Sisters. Maybe we could get a senior to adopt a child. There is no more Boy Scouts.

**7) Is there anything else that you came to this group that you wanted to say but you didn't have the opportunity to say?**

We think the kids are in danger and are at risk. A 16 year is abandoned, the mother is gone and there is no father parent around. This youth is one of the four walking around the street at night. Even if he is emancipated he can't live in trailer. These kids are falling through the cracks. We called DFS and they don't do anything about it. Sheela indicated that she would send contact information on Sharon Weber, Laramie Youth Crisis Center.

***2.) What kind of human services are there in Carbon County?***

There are medical services. For seven years the home health care services were very adequate that were coming from Public Health. The CNA retired and the state did not fill the position. Wealthier people can't get care.

Youth program – Greater Wyoming Big Brothers Big Sisters program. There is a lot of funding from free and reduced lunch program but people don't want to apply for the hot lunch program because the parents think it is bad and the culture indicates that it is bad too. The census doesn't adequately reflect or translate to what children and families are struggling with. They do not reflect a high per capita income.

The last time we did the needs assessment, there is no one in priority to go after those monies.

Good dental – 3 dentists. None of the dentists will take Medicaid. Dr. Whinpenny will take them on occasion.

Daycare is lacking seriously. There is only one licensed providers. The City is working with Excel Preschool and Head Start to have a joint facility. There is a Head Start.

I know that the Department of Education doesn't apply for grants because they don't want to worry about the strings attached.

Sheela indicated that senior services could go after grants.

What could we do as a municipality to go after grants for our community? If we prioritize those ideas then you have a place that people want to move to. Right now we don't have a priority focus. We have to have the interest that benefit our kids and provide recreation.

***Are there any gaps in services?***

Home Health Care positions. In Rawlins from Laramie there is home health only there and won't go to the outlying areas. Is it breaking down nationally? Medicare has changed so much. The people at the Department of Health have a change in philosophy – change in governor. I'm not happy with the Department of Health and where they are going. The Department of Health has resources but it doesn't have a focus on people. It's about a dollar and not the need.

The senior program is dwindling. Seniors are not coming in and they are losing them. Some seniors have to move as they need more in medical care than what can be provided.

Mental health providers are referring people to Colorado for people who need assessments and specialized treatment.

There is no hospice.

Senior Citizen provides bus but it doesn't go to Rawlins for trips because gas is so expensive. People have to rely on friends to take them. The Senior Center Director indicated that she has taken folks herself to medical appointment. She doesn't have the budget for transportation.

We don't know how people go to services. DFS comes once a month for services. If you are in domestic violence you have to apply for it. We don't have a mechanism to transport youth to any services.

The churches have a ministerial fund and they will help some and will put folks up at the motel.

Housing – we need both low income housing and assisted living. A whole packet of surveys indicated senior housing. They need a low income senior housing project that doesn't cost \$3,200 per month. Most of my clients make about a \$1,000 month. If they don't have to pay taxes, insurance, utilities it would help them on their amount of money they have for other things. A for profit group came in and wanted to do a project of \$3,200 per month. That's too much money.

There is a need for assisted living of 8 or 10 units. It would be nice if it could be hooked onto the nursing home.

There are so many services that people have to travel to Rawlins. WIC comes every 3 month. If a person gets a DUI then you can't drive and can't get services.

There is a beautiful room in the public health office that could provide services.

We need money for agencies to come here.

We need substance abuse services and not agency services. There are a couple of licensed providers and maybe they will take Medicaid.

**3.) Of the list that I have passed around which service in Carbon County do you think is the least important?**

Kids get their GED through the community center. Stephanie, the Director at the Community Center helps with that. They are getting GED instruction at the computer lab.

Medical services are okay.

Commodities are not in Saratoga. It would be an absolutely a dream to send children home with food. People don't have food, let alone healthy food. Sue indicated that the Senior Center gets a meal that goes home with them. It contains a little can of chicken salad, powdered milk, orange juice, canned fruit, cookies, crackers. We get them from the Governor We get X number of cases. You have to sign up for these.

Need food backpacks for kids. Not sure that this is done here. There is a food pantry from the Ministerial Association. It is used. Open Saturday 2.5 hours and Tuesdays 2.5 hours.

Don't have a lot of physically disabled servicers. The school has a very high rate of special education.

VA representative comes to Saratoga for the VA. There is also a van that takes the veterans to their appointments in Cheyenne.

**4.) Of this list which service do you think is the most important?**

Child Care – There were 45 kids at the Hub, during this summer. There are younger families here with children. School enrollment is down just a couple of children.

People can't live here because they need child care.

**5.) What would you like your community to work on for families to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient?**

- 1.) Good food for everyone.
- 2.) Assistance with medical help.
- 3.) Child Care and Youth services.
- 4.) Affordable low income housing. It's a pipedream. The only thing that is affordable is the shacks that people are living in. People that have rentals here they have jacked up the rentals.

***7) Is there anything else that you came to this group that you wanted to say but you didn't have the opportunity to say?***

A couple of years ago through the Emergency Health grant there were set aside for meals for those in poverty. We saw so much abuse and never want to do that again. There is a Travelers Assist through the ministerial association and there are some stipulations.

Sixty-two percent of Medicaid costs in the State of Wyoming are tobacco related and if they would fix it with a policy they would have money to fund other programs. We are all paying for it. The biggest piece of the State government is Medicaid.

Doctors and hospitals need to change their views on health care. A patient was in the hospital for thirty days before she got to get Medicaid.

The public members are very pleased with the Doctors in Saratoga and Rawlins, Dr. Knowlton and Dr. Barthomolew. Before we left Minnesota the Dr. didn't know if he would have lived through the trip out here. Now he is properly diagnosed.

Because of the business that we get in to do anything they have to go out of town. The cardio-pulmonary goes to Rawlins. There are not enough people to use the shuttle.

We feel safe here due to the law enforcement and the way that the Town is run. We came from a small town in Minnesota. We can see the positive things of this town

A public member is involved in national issues. The system is breaking down. These problems today will be pale in comparison to a year from now. We don't have an affluent society. He thinks we are really in a bad situation. He brought a brochure and distributed them.

***2.) What kind of human services are there in Carbon County? What are the gaps?***

The medical clinic closed down. It is now in the hands of the Rural Health District. Carbon County Commissioners took it back and gave the key to the Rural Health District. On August

27th there will be a community meeting on this. Rural Health District goes out to Carbon County line, the Sweetwater County line and the forest line. It is assessing 2 mills. We had been funding it. The intent is to get a PA from Craig. We are a special district. Have solid waste district, museum and cemetery and conservation district.

The closing of the medical clinic is a concern. We were never told what the problem was with the non-profit, the Noyes Health Care Center. It was a long-term problem and over the years Medicare was being reimbursed wrong. The ambulance bills haven't been billed for one year. We don't believe it was intentional fraud. Two sets of lawyers have been tinkering with it. We will send out Requests for Proposals. The block grant can help with the low income.

We are way underserved from Rawlins Public Health. They come down here and do immunizations – flue shots. There are no Well baby clinics.

No dental – go to Craig and Rawlins. If on Medicaid they would go to Rawlins.

The clinic would dispense prescription drugs – Insta Meds – it is a vending machine for prescription drugs. Primarily it covers antibiotics but no thyroid medicine. The prescriptions can be paid with insurance. The prescription came from the doctor at the clinic.

There is no eye care.

There is a need for senior housing. There is a sub-group through the Rural Health District working on this. Working on 3 major projects – van with Wyoming Highway Depart – they will pay 80% (like PATS bus) and it can go across the state line. We use the bus to go to Craig. We are also trying to keep seniors at home longer. We need Senior Apartments. We have been learning that if folks are in assisted care then they move into a nursing home. Rather we are looking at in-home services through a national program.

Memorial Hospital had home health care. Did have some care out here. The hospital stopped the program completely. Now they have fired back up with the program. Through the clinic we had home health care. We didn't think that we had a need for this but now we need to have someone local. The seniors need consistency. This spring and summer have had two elderly couples move from the community for transportation. If we had this service in the community they might have stayed.

Child Care – Preschool and daycare center. Have planning grant to the Wyoming Business Council for needs assessment for child care. They have more children than what they can handle. Can we receive child care money from the CSBG program? The Rural Health Council has given them money.

Disability Services – Have ramps. At the new community center have equipment.

Education – wonderful higher education. It is from the University of Wyoming and part of Western Wyoming Center. They have non-credit and credit classes. The Higher Education

Center has picked up slack from the Senior Center and has provided activities for the seniors. The Center does GED. There may be ESL at the school. There are no literacy programs.

Emergency services – Town of Baggs, local different churches provide money if folks need gas money. They also provide clothes to people that needs it. The community church used to get commodities.

Employment and Training – Higher Education. Very good for conducting classes for oil workers. They have all day training.

Counseling – no mental health and substance abuse counseling.

Family Education – this happens very seldom. If being provided, it would be from the school.

There is not good family planning.

The senior center in Dixon and Baggs provides meals. There is no Centsible Nutrition.

WIC – no one shows up. The machine that takes the WIC is too expensive for the little store so it has been removed. Folks are signing up for WIC in Colorado.

Meals on Wheels – can deliver from senior center. A lot of people don't qualify for the program. They are supposed to be for home-bound. Don't have any right now.

There are no substance abuse services. Off and on there might be an alcohol counselor but not on a regular basis.

Pumpers provide stable jobs and families. When we were drilling there were 3 man camps. There were not a lot of troubles.

We have troubles with keeping a policeman. We just hired one. We haven't had a lot of crime. We are very fortunate.

We need transportation for medical appointments.

Youth Services include the best football team, sports, strong FFA, 4-H program, and church youth groups. We have amazing river kids. The kids ride the bus to their after school church activities. The Community Church provides a youth program 5<sup>th</sup> grade to high school. There is a community center. There is an arena at Dixon. There are activities for the kids. We don't have kids walking the streets. The youth services are solid.

Medical Clinic closed down in March 2012. Most senior clients travel to Craig Colorado rather than Rawlins.

The folks in Baggs feel like they are “step-children” of Carbon County. They feel a bit

neglected.

A number of seniors have passed away and a number of them have moved away due to the need for services. Many of them were snowbirds

**2.) What would you like your community to work on for families to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient?**

- 1.) Transportation
- 2.) Senior housing that deals with medical concerns. It is important to keep them in their own home and not be expensive. What kind of services do they need to stay in their home? A lot of insurance will pay for those services. The Rural Health District could pay for it. We need to provide education to seniors.
- 3.) Child Care.

**3.) What can the Tripartite do for you?**

The Board can make us more aware of services and dollars for grants. They can make us a part of community leadership. They need to notice us on the opportunities for funding and opportunities to be on the Board. It's important that the outlying communities get on the board as well.

Home health care and in-service needs to follow their regulations.

We are underserved from county services, mental health, and home health care services. We are working to get home making services. There is a little bit of feeling that we have money down here. The oilfield is a big taxpayer.

The community pulls together to get things done. Had a thank you for how our community works together. We are trying to be good hostesses to those from Craig Colorado. They came up here and toured the whole area.

We do have a little newspaper. We started a women's empowerment group. It was something to do. The newspaper has been a good thing. It also gives employment to people. What we make off the paper makes the employee's house payment. Two of the seniors put the labels on the paper. It's fun and a chance to get together. It helps to get acquainted with other people. When we first started we agreed that there would be no editorials and no letters to the editor.

Don't meet the needs of the poorest of the poorest. We should have family planning. No health well-baby checks Rawlins had a special meeting to get an ambulance for \$99,000. There are places in Rawlins thinks that we are served. We have a fire truck, ambulances (2) and take people to Craig for emergency care. There are lots of activities in the community. We do get some of the younger families involved.

Comments: Public Health Director indicated that emergency health funds ran out in early summer and didn't have any funds to distribute to the low income. As a consequence there weren't very many low income clients that were available to complete the surveys.

***Are there any gaps in services?***

Assisted living - A feasibility study was conducted and completed May 24, 2012. It identified the need for about 32 assisted living, long-term 64 units of assisted living. The City of Rawlins is now ready to do a letter of interest to potential operators. We have met with City and County elected officials along with some public support. It would need to be proven to be an economic benefit. We have also met with Wyoming Business Council to determine the process on feasibility studies. The Wyoming Business Council was focusing on developing a business model. It really wasn't low income assisted living.

Hospice – Folks who need hospice care have to be moved to hospice in Laramie or go to the nursing home.

Adult Day Care. - Adult day care operators have to be licensed with the Department of Health with relatively stringent requirements. We have started to look at all of those issues.

Dentists - There is one dentist, Dr. Davidson that will take Medicaid. There are eye doctors and some physicians that will take Medicaid. There are other physicians in Laramie that will take Medicaid. Other people will take them if they need transportation. They can get help with gas through Salvation Army. Folks have to go out of town for a specialist. There are no pediatricians. There are no cancer resources. One has to go to Laramie or Cheyenne for cancer treatment. Any specialty beyond a family practice will have to go out of town.

Hospital Emergency provides primarily critical care access. It has labor and delivery of births with limited surgical care.

It is difficult to get doctors with a specialty to come and stay. Rawlins and Carbon County doesn't have a draw. The average life of a physician is two years. They leave when the contract expires after 2-3 years or when the wife says I'm out of here.

The hospital is struggling financially so that produces stress on paying doctors what they want, high turnover, can't hire more nurses, short-staffed and over worked. The hospital is

working on their billing system as they are having problems with the software to collect bills. This community needs to diversify its economy and make housing more attractive and obtain more physicians. Suitable housing and shopping is much to be desired for the physician's family. When you are 100 miles from everything it's going to be difficult to keep someone here. If we would be more like a bedroom community we would have better chance of keeping professionals.

Day care is pretty costly. We have calls all of the time that they can't afford the daycare. DFS will give vouchers if they are eligible.

Juvenile services – There is no place if juveniles are in trouble and they are sent out of county. The Carbon County Juvenile Services Board has money for a crisis center. It will provide crisis care, and short-term placement for a few weeks. This provides a cooling off period until they can get into a place of treatment.

Affordable Housing – Section 8 has a year and a half waiting list. The federal requirements are pretty hefty and stringent. Rawlins used to have a huge pool of house to fall back on. Now they are down to a couple of private apartments that have Section 8 housing.

Grocery stores – There is only one grocery store. There is no competition Wal-Mart did look at coming to Rawlins in 2008 but they decided to put it into a 5 year plan. It would be jobs with benefits. Employers are having difficulty with having employees that are on-time for work. There are many staff problems. Work force services are trying to instill the desire to be employed. A sub-committee is working on a plan for this.

Foster homes – no therapeutic foster homes and the children are sent to Casper. There are not necessarily enough foster homes. DFS is having a hard time finding homes.

Education is challenge for the community as many need technical training. The community college is involved to train workers to be more productive.

Substance abuse is a huge issue. There is not adequate treatment as there is a big need for treatment. Providers are overwhelmed with workload that they have. The question was asked of how many more providers you would need to fill the gap to get a professional staff. This is sort of the same issues to attract providers as it is with a physician.

There is no inpatient substance abuse. This is a long term investment of opening up a site Not sure that this would be viable.

There is no homeless shelter or Soup Kitchen.

**3.) Of this list which service do you think is the most important?**

Substance Abuse Professionals is the most pressing need.

Emergency Services - The City of Rawlins indicated that they get calls that the pipes are freezing and they need place to sleep for the night. DFS has historically been helpful. They need overnight food until they get to the store. The City receives calls 2-3 times per week requesting emergency services. The County Attorney has a homeless grant for those potentially going to get homeless. It is a 45 page application with proof of everything. The St. Vincent De Paul food baskets require cooking and can't eat in the hotel room. There is a list of affordable motels but with the current construction in Sinclair (bring in out-of state workers for 3-9 months) the motels and hotels fill up fast.

A homeless shelter is needed due to economy. We used to have a Soup Kitchen but we don't have one any more. . A lot of the time the churches wouldn't fill in their time. St. Thomas church had to cover a lot of days.

The biggest need is for emergency services. Salvation Army provides some emergency services. There is a need for funding when people run out of money for propane, rent, utility bill, gas to get back and forth from Saratoga, Hanna.

The Pastor of Oasis Church indicates that there is need for senior services. He hears a lot about health care, and folks that have to leave the community to get to health care. He receives lots of calls on Sunday for services and help. He hears a lot about amenities and shopping

Realtor indicated that there is a need for Affordable/suitable housing. We need low income

housing and housing for professionals. The need for suitable housing is broad.

The state representative gets a number of calls for emergency help, i.e., where can one get certain help for tonight. It is a shame that people need food. There is a need for a food pantry. There is a need for food donations at other times of the year than the holidays. There is a food bank. There is also a need for people to get food. There are a lot more people living on the edge than the community wants to admit it. We need something to fill this gap. It is difficult for one thing to get out of poverty.

Public Health indicated that when people come into town they look for assistance. You find out later they had a bus ticket to go from somewhere else to go to Rawlins. They get a bus ticket to closest home shelter. We have been doing emergency services and parenting classes it is still a need. You would think that you would get saturated. There is not stable enough to work. There is a need for dentists. There are many people that have dental pain. It is difficult for us to find a dentist to see them. Most of the dentists will take vouchers. It takes a long time to get in to see someone. We try to refer them to other programs and agencies. Some folks are referred to the thrift store and get some work down there. We refer to Workforce Services or to get day labor. There is also a need for older people that don't drive to take them to Casper, Cheyenne for medical services.

The City of Rawlins indicated that there is a need for economic diversity that creates local sustainability. It creates more resources to assist in the development of the community.

A tripartite board member indicated that the comments tonight give substance to the fact that no one's kids want to stay in Rawlins any more.

A public member indicated that there is stress and distress in the community. Thirty percent (30%) of those that live in Rawlins dictate the economic foundation for the county and 70% have limited access to services listed. We should have easy access to mental health for the 70%. The 70% struggle getting kids to school. There are many kids that are drop-outs but don't have a male figure in their lives. They need a role model. We need to make it conducive to stay here. There needs to be amenities. The upper 30% have access to services and 30% do not have access. This affects the 70%. Don't know how to fix it. It's about attitude. It's important where the community spends their money. If you want people to be here, you need to embrace them. We need to look at thriving here and not just surviving.

***2.) What would you like your community to work on for families to get out of poverty and become self-sufficient?***

The things that you want to do in the community;

- 1.) Emergency Housing
- 2.) Soup Kitchen
- 3.) Child Care for low income
- 4.) Senior Care – assisted living, adult day care.
- 5.) Increase retail shopping opportunities

## 6.) Housing that is affordable and suitable

The state representative indicated that there is a need for education. He works for BP in Wamsutter in the gas field. Unless they get their Associate's Degree they won't be able to work as an operator. For the unskilled there used to be good filler jobs. There is not fill-in work any more until we see something else come into the area. Even the new cars have a 3 ft long service manual. It is a vicious cycle that the economy is moving quickly away from these people. We need beds for mothers with substance abuse for residential care. Let's not make it a punitive event. There is apathy of the community - look at how many are there here. This is a poor turn-out.

Grant-writing – Can only apply one grant in a submission in a category to the Wyoming Business Council unless we have the support of another agency to be the sponsor. With budgets being more competitive we have to look at more partnerships. We did partner with the county on a grant application. We did partner with the Town of Sinclair to create an enhancement to the high school to develop some amenities – vocational training center which would cooperate with the high school. This would benefit both high school and community college communities. The City didn't have the money to apply for a Business Ready Community grant alone.

*We will make recommendations to the tripartite board on what they should look at for community action plan. When all of this is done a final report is available to public. PDF file will be put on a website. This data has been used by other counties-for people to use. This data will be available 10/1.*

## C. Quantitative Data

A number of key documents were scanned and key information and is reported in this needs assessment to assist the Carbon County Action Program in determining a priority of needs. Key demographics reviewed are NASCSP CSBG/IS 2010 National Performance Indicators Survey, general population, race and ethnicity, income, number of households, employment, housing, cost of living, Community Development Block Grant Poverty indicators, health and substance, youth, child and family indicators, a socioeconomic profile of Carbon County Wyoming conducted by Headwaters Economics, needs assessments conducted by the Wyoming Rural Development Council and a Feasibility Study, Rawlins Aging In place. Following is the compilation of this data:

### **1. Carbon County CSBG Performance Demographic Profiles based on NASCSP CSBG/IS 2011 National Performance Indicators Survey:**

This survey was completed by the Carbon County Community Service Block Grant agencies and was submitted to Wyoming Department of Health in fall 2011. To summarize the CSBG clients from this data the majority of clients are female, between the ages of 6-11, White and

not Hispanic, High School Graduates/GED, do have health insurance, are not disabled, are two parent households with a family size of 4, income comes from one or more sources of income with the majority coming from general assistance and employment only, fall within up to 76-100% of poverty income guidelines, and rent. Following are the demographic responses for the Carbon County Action Agency are found in **Table 12**:

## **2.) Carbon County Demographics Profile:**

### **Population:**

The 2010 population of Carbon County according to the US Census was 15,885 and as of July 1, 2011 the population is 15,786 representing a -.6% decrease. During this same time period the State of Wyoming had a 15.1% increase in population. There are 1,402 more males than females.

Greatest increases occurred in the following age categories:

- 25 to 29 years old with a 41% increase
- 55 to 59 years old with a 32.6% increase
- Under 5 with a 23% increase

The 45 to 49 years old age bracket showed a 20.5% decrease.

### Population by Age Groups

The largest age category by number is 50-54. Following are the age and gender groups in this population from 2000 to July 1, 2011 as shown in **Table 13** below.

### Population by Race and Ethnicity:

### Income/Wages

The U.S. Census Bureau estimated Median Household Income for Carbon County effective December 9, 2011 was \$56,565 in comparison to Wyoming's Median Family Income of \$53,802. Median household income is the middle number present in a set of data when the incomes of all households are arranged in an order of highest to lowest level. **Table 16** reflects the Median Household Incomes for the communities in Carbon County:

The Town of Dixon has the highest median household income and the Town of Medicine Bow has the lowest median household income.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages is showing that the average weekly wages in Carbon County increased from \$471 in 2001 to \$749 in 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, 2011. According to the Wyoming State Equal Pay Fact Sheet, “In 2010, the typical woman in Wyoming working full time, year round was paid only 64 cents to every dollar paid to a man working full-time, year round and is 13 cents wider than the nationwide gap of 77 cents.” Using this formula women in Carbon County make about \$479.36 per week. This report also indicated that this income is generally coming from more than one job. Headwater Economics states that service-providing employees (3,206 workers) were paid an average of \$28,831. Using the formula as stated above, the average annual wage is \$18,451.84. Service providing employees are typically female workers. The Wyoming Housing Database Partnership indicates that 36.5% of the population in poverty in Carbon County is women between 18 to 64.

According to the State of Wyoming Department of Health, Community and Rural Health there are 1,863 persons (3% of statewide low-income population) reporting living below the poverty level.

Not counted in these figures are the working poor who generally do not qualify for benefits, but live paycheck to paycheck in less than good conditions. This almost invisible population makes painful financial choices every month; medicine or food? Gas for the car or shoes for the child? Any unforeseen problem such as illness, their car breaking down or other everyday setbacks, places the working poor in crisis mode below poverty. Growth in the ranks of poor children in poor families over the past few decades has not been due to an increase in the number of welfare-dependent families; rather, it is because the ranks of the working poor have been growing.

### **Employment:**

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Carbon County's labor force, defined as the number of people working or actively seeking work decreased by 157 persons from 7,864 in 2009 to 7,707 in 2010. Employment decreased by 164 persons. Unemployment increased to a 7.6% rate in 2010 in comparison with 4.3% in 2000. This is worse than the State of Wyoming unemployment rate at 7.0%

### **Housing:**

The average apartment rent in Carbon County increased by 3.1 % from \$678 in 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, 2010 to \$699, 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter 2011. The average mobile home lot rent is \$288 and the average monthly rental expense for a mobile home and a lot is \$671.

The vacancy rate of rentals is 6.73 % compared to 14.1% one year ago. As of July 2011 the statewide vacancy rate is 5.5%. Based on the Wyoming Department of Transportation 2011 Housing Needs Assessment Survey 22.2% of respondents who are currently renting indicated

that they would spend between \$475 to \$849, another 11.1% indicated that they would spend more \$850 a month for rent.

The average sales price of existing, detached, single family homes was \$150,233. This represented a decrease of 3.2% percent from the previous year. In contrast the State of Wyoming's average was \$250,958, an increase of 3.9 percent over the previous year.

### **Cost of Living:**

The cost of living for Carbon County is tied for tenth highest in the State with a ranking of 99. Carbon County is tied with Lincoln-Kemmerer Counties. One Hundred (100) is the statewide average. This ranking compares food, housing, apparel, transportation, medical, recreation and personal care. Of these rankings transportation is the highest (102), medical and recreation and personal care are both at 101. Food is the lowest at a ranking of 98.

## **2. Community Services Block Grant Poverty Factors**

According to the FY 2013 Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) the County Poverty Factors for fund allocation Carbon County ranked 11th among the counties in the State. This reflects a poverty ranking of 2.8 or 2.77% of CSBG funds. Factors included are:

- 1,863 Low Income Population and is 3% of State Low Income Population
- 446 People Out of Work and is 2.6% of State Unemployed Population
- 489 People on Food Stamps and is 3.3% of State Food Stamp Population
- 1,281 People on Title XIX and is 3% of State XIX Population
- 8 People on Power TANF and is 2.3% of the State Of Wyoming Power TANF Population
- 168 Applications Received for State Assistance and is 3.1% of State Applications Received for Assistance Population
- 140 people on SSI and is 2.2% of the State Population of SSI

## **3. Health, Mental Health and Child Care**

**General Health:** A study by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute indicates that Carbon County along with Fremont

County were considered the least healthy of the Wyoming's 23 counties. This study looked at factors as smoking rates, access to health care, education and poverty levels and healthy physical environments.

**Health Care Access:** Based on Wyoming Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System telephone survey conducted between 2005-2009, 18.7% of the Carbon County population as compared to 16.2% of all Wyoming counties has no health care coverage. A little over twenty-seven percent (27.1%) of the Carbon County population as compared 25.9 of all Wyoming counties does not have a personal doctor. Thirteen percent (13.2%) of the Carbon County population as compared to 12.4% of all Wyoming counties indicated that they needed to see a doctor but couldn't because of the cost at least one time in the past months. A little over forty-one percent (41.3%) of the population indicated that they had any of the three access issues as described above in comparison to 38.1% in all Wyoming counties.

**Dental Health:** Based on the statewide telephone survey of adults age 18 and older, Wyoming Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System telephone conducted between 2005-2009, 42.5% of the Carbon County population as compared to 31.5% of all Wyoming counties reported having no dental visit in past year, 2006-2008. Nearly 32.2% of Carbon County residents, age 45+ as compared to 25.6% of all Wyoming counties have poor oral health, i.e., they lost 6+ teeth for age 45+, 2006-2008. A little over fifty percent (50.3%) of Carbon County residents as compared to 44.7% of all Wyoming counties reported having lost one or more permanent teeth due to gum disease or decay. A little over 48.3% of Carbon County residents as compared to 34.2% of all Wyoming counties indicated that their teeth had not been cleaned in the past year, 2006-2008.

**Teen Births:** The teen birth rate increased from 2000 to 2004 at 45 to 59 from 2005-2009.

**Maternal and Infant Health:** According to the Wyoming Children's Action Alliance of the Wyoming Kids Count Report of the five categories related to maternal and infant health only one category was better across time, 2005-2009. The categories of out of county births, infant mortality rate, less than adequate prenatal care, and low birth weight babies all reflected a worse trend. Specifically infant mortality rate was 14.9 for Carbon County in comparison to Wyoming at 7%. Low birth weight babies in Carbon County reflected 10% while in comparison to Wyoming the rate was 8.6%. Of significance was that in 2006 25% of mothers smoked during pregnancy while in 2009 only 19% of all mothers who smoked during pregnancy in Carbon County. This is in comparison to 20% (2006) and 19% (2009) of Wyoming birthing mothers who smoke during pregnancy.

**Mental Health:** Nearly two percent (1.6%) of Carbon County indicated in the Wyoming Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System, 2007-2009 that their mental health, which includes serious psychological distress, in the past 30 days. This is comparison to 2.6% of all Wyoming counties. . A little over eight percent (8.2%) of this same population indicated that as compared to the Wyoming county population (11.6%) reported taking medicine or receiving treatment from a doctor or other health professional for a mental health condition or emotional problem. A little over sixteen percent (16.1%) of Carbon population also reported that they are binge drinkers (5 or more drinks on an occasion at least once in the past

30 days), 4.5% reported that they were heavy drinkers (men drinking more than 60 drinks of alcohol and women drinking more than 30 drinks of alcohol in the past 30 days) and 4.5% reported that they were extreme drinking (10 or more drinks on any occasion in the past 30 days).

**Child Care:** According to the Wyoming Children's Action Alliance, the child care availability rate (licensed care spaces per 100 children under age 5) in Carbon County has decreased from 2002 to 2009 by 5%.

#### **4. Children and Youth in Poverty:**

A little over 176 or 15.3% of the children (5 and under) live below in poverty as compared to 12.8% statewide. Nearly fourteen percent (13.5%) or 156 children 6-17 live in poverty as compared to 17.7% statewide.

The Wyoming Department of Education indicates the following percentages for children who have free and reduced school lunches:

Carbon County School District #1 – 37.32% of total enrollment.  
Carbon School District #2 – 42.65% of total enrollment.  
Wyoming – 36.73% of total enrollment.

A number of community needs assessments were conducted through Carbon County since the last community needs assessment. They include Medicine Bow Five – Year Follow-up in 2009, and Encampment Five Year Follow-up in 2010. Below is a summary of themes pertinent to this needs assessment:

## **6. A Profile of Socioeconomic Measures, Carbon County Wyoming from Headwaters Economics**

This profile of Carbon County was produced on August 29, 2012. The profile provides long-term population growth, employment and personal income by industry; average earnings; business development, retirement and other non-labor income; commuting patterns; agriculture and earnings by industry. This profile was scanned and presented below are the key points as related to this assessment of poverty in Carbon County:

### Population Growth

- From 2000 to 2011 population grew by 51 people, a 1% increase which is contributed to natural change (births and deaths).

### Employment

- From 1970 to 2010, wage and salary employment (people who work for someone else) grew from 6,164 to 7,255 or an 18% increase.
- From 1970 to 2010 proprietors (self-employed) grew from 1,015 to 2,664, a 162% increase.
- From 2001 to 2010, jobs in services related industries grew from 5,183 to 5,382, a 4% increase.

### Income

- From 2001 to 2010, personal income in services related industries grew from \$153 million to \$181 million or an 18% increase.
- In 2011, services related jobs employed the largest number of people (3,206) and non-services related employed the smallest (1,324).
- Services related employees were paid an average of \$27,524.

## **7. Rawlins Aging In Place Feasibility Study**

The Rawlins Aging in Place Feasibility Study was conducted by Business Resource Group, LLC. with the purpose of addressing options to retain and support the County's elderly population. The demographics indicate that 27% of Carbon County residents are age 55 and over and 13% are age 65 and over. There appears to be out-migration or loss of retirement – age residents beginning at age 6- due to limited senior services. Forty-six% of Carbon County seniors age 85+ and 47% of those 75-84 have annual household incomes of \$25,000 or less. Forty-three percent of Carbon County seniors age 65+ live alone and more than 75% own their home. Sale of their homes could provide the funds for other senior living options.

An assisted living facility would mostly attract those that live alone, is age-qualified or income-qualified or requires assistance with activities of daily living. The primary market area for the project would be for seniors who live in the northern part of Carbon County.

The project is feasible if an independent developer is identified and willing to assume development of the project.

## **D. Summary of Needs Assessment**

The intent of the needs assessment was to find out the following:

- Extent of poverty in Carbon County
- Factors that support the creation of poverty
- Factors that exacerbate the impact of poverty
- Services and resources currently available to offset creation or impact of poverty
- Priorities for meeting needs
- Barriers to services

Following is a summary of the results of each of these goals:

### **Extent of Poverty in Carbon County:**

- Carbon County holds 3.0% (1,863/62,636) of statewide population of those who live in poverty
- 1,154 persons (8.2%) of total Carbon County population live below the poverty level.)

- 15.3% of children live near or below the poverty level (332 children, 0-18) live below 100% of Federal Poverty Level (2010) as compared to 12.8% statewide.
- In Carbon County there are 800 single parent families and of these 76.5% are headed by a single mother; of these over 50% are living below the poverty level.
- Between 37.32% and 42.65% of school-aged children have free or reduced lunch. Many more families are qualified for free and reduced lunch but they believe it is bad to ask for help. Sally of Project Prevention in Saratoga indicated, “People don’t want to apply for the hot lunch program. Parents think it is bad.”
- While the census gives statistical data but it doesn’t describe the issues that families are struggling with nor does it reflect families that have a high capita income. Sally of Project Prevention indicated “The census doesn’t adequately reflect or translate to what children and families are struggling with. They do not reflect a high capita income.”

#### **Factors that Support the Creation of Poverty:**

- The cost of living (food, housing, apparel, transportation, medical, recreation and personal care) for Carbon County is the tenth highest in the State with a ranking of 101(tied with Natrona, and Lincoln Counties.) One Hundred (100) is the statewide average.
  - Transportation is the highest ranking (102). The distances between communities in Carbon County is great, gas is expensive for those that have an automobile, and transportation options is sometimes non-existent in the smaller communities.
  - Medical and recreation and personal care at a ranking of 101.
- Wyoming women working full time year round in Wyoming are paid only 64 cents to every dollar paid to white, non-Hispanic men working full time.
- More than 300 of the 4,134 families in Carbon County are living on less than \$18,310/year (family of 3 – mother and two children). In reality they would need to make more than \$28,000 to be truly self-sufficient.
- Many low income families work in the service industry with no health benefits. Headwater Economics states that service-providing employees were paid an average of \$27,524. In consideration that women make 36% less then men this equates to \$17,615.36.
- Nearly 19% (18.6%) of the Carbon County population has no health care coverage which leads to medical bills that impoverished families pay.
- Nearly 19% (18.6%) of the Carbon County population has no health care coverage which leads to medical bills that impoverished families will have to pay.
- Those that are qualified for services are not receiving services. Of the survey respondents when asked, “What new services did your family need in the past three years?” sixty-nine (69) respondents indicated, “None or none that I qualify for.”

**Factors that Exacerbate the Impacts of Poverty:**

- Monthly rental fee is easily more than 25% of take-home wages.
- Service jobs with poor wages and no benefits.
- Transportation from outlying areas to areas of services (medical, social services, etc.) is not always available.
- There were some good paying jobs but many of them have disappeared due to economic downturn.
- Single parents working and not home with their children which may lead to home issues.
- High cost of groceries, gas and propane.
- Unsafe housing i.e., full of mold leads to other health issues.
- Medical services need to be at rates for fixed income people that are affordable and not \$85 to \$100 a visit.
- Seniors have cut down or quit taking medications so that they can pay utility bills which leads to other medical issues.
- Many are not qualified for services but don't have the resources to obtain them.

**Services and Resources Currently Available to Offset Creation or Impacts of Poverty:**

- Most services are available in Rawlins and Saratoga but little to no services available in outlying areas.
- Good linkages/referrals among various providers of services and resources in two pockets of population but in outlying areas information services are sketchy.
- Excellent resource directory for providers and agencies are providing linkages to resources.
- While the services may not be available, volunteers try to the best of their ability to fill in the gap.
- The Snake River Valley has created a Rural Health District to provide medical services, transportation to health care and prescription drugs.
- Carbon County Higher Education Center is offering wage negotiation workshops for high school females and the adult Latina population.

**Priorities for Meeting Needs:**

- Accessibility/Affordability to Medical Services. Dental, Prescription Drugs & Eye care (410 points)
- Senior Services (331 points)
- Affordable Housing (320 points)
- Transportation (241 points)
- Food/Commodities & Nutrition Services (230 points)
- And while Youth Services was not highly ranked, it is one of the goals of the CSBG funds. If funding is eliminated for this need, the problem could be exacerbated.

**Barriers to Services:**

- Attitude of 30% of the population effects the rest of the 70% and prohibits the 70% to be engaged in the community and feeling a part of the community.

- Recommendation: We need to find ways to embrace the 70% - shopping, banking, health care, and encouragement to stay in Carbon County and thrive in this community.
- Apathy leads to those needing services to not apply and to not participate in the public process. It also lessens the amount received from federal and state dollars. Of the survey respondents when asked, “What new services did your family need in the past three years?” sixty-nine (69) respondents indicated, “None or none that I qualify for.”
  - Recommendation: Involve the low income representatives of the Tripartite Board in engaging the low income to apply for needed services.
- Clients need to know of services available and apply for them
  - Recommendation: Current Resource Directory for clients (short and sweet)
- Lack of funding (local, state, federal) to non-profits and county agencies
  - Recommendation: Develop community grant-writers or community-wide notice of funding opportunities.
- Lack of basic services in communities, i.e., grocery, gasoline and human services produces own problems and costs people more money to travel to other locations to obtain services.
  - Recommendation:
    - 1.) Explore business enterprise opportunities to fill the gaps in the outlying communities.
    - 2.) Explore county-wide transit system to assist people with transportation needs.

### **E. Community Forums/Public Meetings**

Once the surveys, interviews and quantifiable data were completed a draft of the findings were reported to the Carbon County Community Action Committee on September 6, 2012 in a Dialogue on Poverty. Invitations and an advertisement appeared in the Rawlins Times inviting the public to attend the meeting. Also a radio interview with Gwynn Bartlett of the Tripartite Board was broadcast on Bigfoot 99 Radio and also appeared on the radio website. This Dialogue on Poverty provided a summary of the findings of the needs assessment to date via a PowerPoint presentation and comments and questions from the Tripartite Board and other community members. There were three board members present and 15 community members (see Appendix D) in attendance

Comments and discussion occurred on the following:

- 1.) A question was asked regarding the income limits of the federal poverty guidelines and why there weren't more people in this number. The response was that the 2012 Federal Poverty Guidelines limits the income level of those receiving CSBG services. Following is the 2012 Poverty Guidelines:

2.) After review of the ages and numbers of the survey respondents and the number of people that either owned or rented a home, the Head Start agency representatives indicated that they felt the survey was a bit skewed because the survey respondents were mostly seniors and it didn't take into account the Head Start families. They also felt that nearly all of their clients do not own their own home and rent. The response was that the survey had a short time frame to get completed (August 3<sup>rd</sup>- August 31<sup>st</sup>) and the Head Start families were not back into the program during the time that the survey was distributed. We discussed that a better time frame would be to distribute the surveys during the school year. We also discussed that the Carbon County Public Health office had expended all of their emergency money in June and there were very few clients available to complete the survey to provide a younger representation of the community.

3.) A comment was made in response to the overwhelming results that there are transportation needs in the outlying communities to receive medical services in facilities away from their community. A public member indicated that there is no reason why AMTRAK can't make a stop in Carbon County at least once per week to pick up passengers to go to Laramie, Cheyenne or Denver.

4.) In discussion of various needs assessment as related to the low income in Carbon County a public member indicated that the document, "Rawlins Aging In Place Feasibility Study" dated May 24, 2012 should be reviewed and included in the report. This suggestion has been completed.

5.) A City of Rawlins representative indicated that she felt there should be better identification of specific projects that would be completed under the Priority of Needs categories recognizing that that the Board wouldn't be able to complete money intensive projects with such limited funding. The Tripartite Board agreed and responded that the 2013 CSBG Application had already been submitted but they would be identifying specific areas of funding when they meet in October 2012.

- 6.) The Board also indicated that they knew emergency services, emergency housing, emergency food and emergency transportation was an area of concern but the community needs to have an agency in the community to take ownership of that project so that eligibility and data could be kept on the individuals receiving that assistance.
- 7.) Discussion occurred about the fact that there are many more residents that are in poverty but they are not participating in programs and therefore they are not reflective in the statistics as they are not requesting those services. The agencies discussed the fact that their clients believe that if they ask for assistance then they are on welfare and have the stigma of welfare. A Board member also indicated that they people in Carbon County are very proud people and they don't want to take any help.
- 8.) It was agreed by the Board, the public and the agencies that Child Care should be added to the priority list because it was mentioned as a high priority for the human service agencies. This priority will be included in the final recommendations.
- 9.) Board members talked about the need to get more people to serve on the Tripartite Board as there was not good participation from some members at the board meetings. Some members of the audience talked to the Board members about becoming a member.

#### **IV. Community Action Plan**

In conclusion, the recommendation from the findings of the needs assessment and public comment at the Dialogue on Poverty for the Community Action is as follows:

- Priority 1: Accessibility/Affordability to medical services, dental, prescription drugs and eye care
- Priority 2: Senior Services
- Priority 3: Affordable Housing
- Priority 4: Transportation
- Priority 5: Food/Commodities & Nutrition Services
- Priority 6: Child Care
- Priority 7: Youth Services

It is recommended that funding be appropriated to various community agencies according to the FY 2012 needs assessment findings presented in this report. The FY 2013 CSBG application has already been submitted to the Wyoming Department of Health but funding during the next two years is to be allocated toward these priorities.


